Message from the Chair, Debbie Jabbour, MLA for Peace River

As Chair of the NADC, I am thrilled to share in this newsletter some of the great work that Council and staff have been doing in the last four months.

In January, Council met with the Minister of Transportation, Hon. Brian Mason, to discuss the importance of strong networks for the region and, specifically, the merits of a Transportation and Utility Corridor linking Fort McMurray and Peace River.

We hosted a roundtable discussion with northern MLAs where the issues discussed included: tourism development, transportation corridors and market access, recruitment and retention of health professionals, and impacts of species at risk legislation. A roundtable discussion with northern college presidents was valuable in understanding emerging issues facing students and post-secondary training providers in the region. Both roundtables will be advanced on an annual basis moving forward, continuing our strong tradition of collaboration and engagement between Council and key leaders in the north.

We wrapped up the fiscal year with two Opportunity Seminars on the emerging Bio-Fibre Food Industry and Alternative Energies. Both were well attended and provided valuable learning and networking opportunities with experts in the field.

I was pleased in March to meet with our Deputy Premier and Minister of Health, Hon. Sarah Hoffman, to discuss next steps related to the Northern Health Summit and ways NADC can support communities to improve health care delivery.

Our recent recruitment campaign for new members has closed, and we look forward to the appointment of new members to continue the strong tradition of support that the Council brings to developing the northern region.

Northern Health Summit and Continued Collaboration in the NADC Region

Alberta Health will continue to learn from many communities and organizations, including NADC, about the unique needs and challenges of the region and how to continue to support Albertans in the north. I look forward to continuing these collaborative efforts to address the health care needs of our northern municipalities and indigenous communities. NORTHLAND SCHOOL DIVISION NO.61

A series of community engagements occurred throughout 2015 to 2017 with community stakeholders in the Northland School Division (NSD) to discuss governance and potential amendments to the Northland School Division Act. The NADC was approached to provide support related to the engagement of northern communities in the advancement of community consultations related to the Northlands School Division.

Council is pleased to see several of their recommendations advanced in the latest announcement by the Minister of Education, the Honourable David Eggen with respect to the new structure of NSD. For example, Council's recommendation that "the new Northland School Division Board of Trustees implement a 'consultation strategy' that allows each community/school to elect or appoint an official representative to provide regular input to the Board on issues specific to their local community/school."

Geothermal, solar, biomass, and wind energy have the potential to transform northern Alberta communities through innovation, economic diversification, and energy independence. To move renewable energy production forward in the north, the NADC hosted two seminars attracting 115 total delegates in Athabasca (March 28) and in Peace River (March 30).

The seminars showcased experts in each energy technology, successful community projects, growing business opportunities, various funding programs, and the development of cooperatives. The Alberta Community & Cooperatives Association (ACCA) prepared a Community Energy Co-operative Toolkit and provided an overview of the potential for energy cooperatives.

AWARDS, BURSARIES & 2017
SCHOLARSHIPS

The NADC administers return service bursaries to attract and retain skilled professionals in demand to support the growth and development of our region.

During the 2016/17 fiscal year:

- \$621,000 was awarded towards the NADC bursaries (including medical, pharmacy, veterinary and nurse practitioner programs);
- \$376,000 was awarded towards the Northern Student Teacher Bursary;
- \$494,000 was awarded towards the FNMI bursary; and
- \$247,400 was awarded towards the Bursary Partnerships program (\$120,450 NADC portion and \$126,950 from sponsors that include northern employers or community organizations).
